## Article 7.3 English language requirement for English-language Master's programmes

1.	The proficiency requirement in English as the language of instruction can be met if the	
	applicant has successfully completed one of the following examinations or an	
	equivalent:	
	- IELTS: 7.5, with a minimum of 6.5 on each item;	



- TOEFL paper based test: 600, with a minimum of 55 on each component and 4.0 in TWE;
- TOEFL internet based test: 100, with a minimum of 20-23 on each component;
- Cambridge Advanced English: A, B or C.
- 2. Exemption from the examination in English referred to in the first paragraph will be granted to students who, at the start of the study programme:
- did not meet the requirements of the VU test of English Language Competence TOEFL ITP more than two years ago, at least with the scores as stipulated in the first paragraph, or
- has a secondary or tertiary education background in an English-speaking country and is listed as such on the VU website, or
- holds a English-language degree in 'international baccalaureate', or
- has a Bachelor's or Master's degree in the Netherlands from an English-language programme accredited by NVAO.

#### Appendix 2

#### General exit qualifications

#### Knowledge and insight

 Students have obtained knowledge of the complexity and diversity of the academic field of language and communication and are able to conduct this knowledge in their judgements of their own research and the research of others.

#### Applying knowledge and insight

- Students are able to contribute independently to the academic debate on their own field of research.
- Students are able to conduct independent academic research.

#### Assesment

- Students are able to academically reflect on use of language in institutional settings.
- Students are willing and able to take into account social—cultural, academic and ethical aspects in their judgement about and analysis of complex academic issues in the field of language and communication.
- Students are willing and able to reflect on methodological, historical and ethicalsocietal aspects of language behaviour research.

#### Communication

- Students are able to report about academic research following the conventions of the field of research.
- Students have good oral and written communication skills in Dutch; students are able to report about their own and other's research in an attractive manner, suitable for a broader audience.

#### Learning skills

 Students are able to function in a societal function that matches the Master's programme, or to follow a PhD's programme in the field of Language and Communication.

#### **Exit qualifications Multimodal Communication**

### Knowledge and understanding

- The student is conversant in different approaches to the question of what constitutes multimodality.
- The student is familiar with the complexity and diversity of the forms of multimodal communication, and in particular, with the place that linguistic forms can play in them.
- The student knows about differences between multimodality in more spontaneous communication (e.g., in face-to-face contexts) and in more prepared communication (as in contexts of edited media).
- The student knows the potential cognitive and communicative effects of different forms of multimodal communication.

## Applying one's knowledge and understanding

 The student can apply appropriate theories and methods to analyze various forms of multimodal media in different domains of communication.



- The student can analyze how different modes/semiotic codes and different audio-visual means of communication are combined in different contexts and in specific instantiations.

#### Making judgments

- The student is able to critically reflect on and evaluate the relative value of different theoretical and methodological approaches with respect to the analysis of different forms of multimodal communication.
- The student is capable of reflecting on the distinction between scholarly, social/ethical, and commercial interests in the study of forms of multimodal communication.

#### **Admission requirements CIS**

#### **Multimodal communication**

Direct admission to the Master's programme is possible with a Bachelor's degree in English Language and Culture, Linguistics, and Communication and Information Studies from VU Amsterdam. Applications from students with equivalent Bachelor's degrees from other universities in the Netherlands have to be submitted to the Examination Board for assessment.

If you have a Bachelor's degree in another subject, the Examination Board will decide what subjects you will be required to take in preparation for the Master's programme. Depending on the number of subjects you have to take, you will either have to register for and complete the Bachelor's programme or you will be permitted to register for the pre-Master's course (one year maximum).
