A. Faculty section

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1. General provisions

Article 1.1 Applicability of the Regulations

Article 1.2 Definitions

The following definitions are used in these Regulations (in alphabetical order):

a. academic year: the period beginning on 1 September and ending on 31 August of the

following calendar year;

b. CvB: the Executive Board of Vrije Universiteit Amsterdam. c. EC (European Credit): an EC credit with a workload of 28 hours of study;

d. educational component: a unit of study of the programme within the meaning of the WHW;

e. examination: the final examination of the Master's programme;

f. FGV: Faculty joint assembly – assembly of the faculty student council and faculty

staff council;

g. interim examination: an assessment of the student's knowledge, understanding and skills relating

to a course component. The assessment is expressed in terms of a final mark. An interim examination may consist of one or more partial examinations. A resit always covers the same material as the original

interim examination;

h. joint degree: a degree awarded by an institution together with one or more institutions

in the Netherlands or abroad, after the student has completed a study programme (a degree programme, a major or a specific curriculum within a degree programme) for which the collaborating institutions are jointly

responsible;

i. OLC: programme committee;j. period: a part of a semester;

k. practical exercise: the participation in a practical training or other educational learning

activity, aimed at acquiring certain (academic) skills. Examples of practical

exercises are:

o researching and writing a thesis or dissertation

o carrying out a research assignment

taking part in fieldwork or an excursion

taking part in another educational learning activity aimed at

acquiring specific skills, or

o participating in and completing a work placement;

m. SAP/SLM: the student information system (Student Lifecycle Management);

n. semester: the first (September - January) or second half (February - August) of an

Study Guide is available electronically at: https://www.vu.nl/en/study-guide/;

p. subject see 'educational component';

q. thesis: a component comprising research into the literature and/or contributing to

scientific research, always resulting in a written report;

r. university: Vrije Universiteit Amsterdam;

s. WHW: the Dutch Higher Education and Research Act (Wet op het Hoger Onderwijs

en Wetenschappelijk Onderzoek);

t. workload: the workload of the unit of study to which an interim examination applies,

expressed in terms of credits = EC credits (ECTS = European Credit and Transfer Accumulation System). The workload for 1 year (1,680 hours) is 60

EC credits.

u. essay exam a writing assignment that is the interim examination or partial examination

of an educational component.

Article 4.2 Adaptations for students with a disability

Appendix 2

Programme objective and exit qualifications

Objectives

- 1. The aim of the programme is to teach the student specialist knowledge, skills and understanding in the field of linguistics and/or language technology, and to prepare them for academic practice in the field of linguistics and/or language technology.
- 2. The degree programme also promotes the academic development of the student, in particular with reference to:
- a. developing an independent academic thought process and approach;
- b. communicating at an academic level in the student's own language and at least one second language;
- c. applying specialist academic knowledge in a wider and/or philosophical and societal context.
- 3. The programme focuses on students' personal development, in order to promote their awareness of social responsibility and develop their language skills in Dutch and/or English.

Exit qualifications

The exit qualifications that students must achieve by the end of the Master's programme can broadly be described as follows:

Basic intellectual skills

- Logical reasoning skills;
- The ability to apply and question modes of reasoning in the field of study;
- The ability to take a stance in a scientific debate and to evaluate this stance in a critical manner;
- The ability to reflect on their own thinking and actions and to make modifications where necessary;
- The ability to integrate ethical, normative and expressive ways of thinking into academic thought;
- The ability to communicate research and solutions to colleagues and non-specialists;
- The ability to handle and evaluate complex situations in a well-reasoned manner;
- The ability to take part in and contribute to debates on the latest developments in the field and their implications for society.

Inquisitive attitude

- The ability to discover new points of view and establish connections even when seemingly trivial matters are concerned;
- The ability to demonstrate originality in critical awareness;
- The ability to act independently when determining a direction for gaining knowledge, conducting research, professional practice, and choosing a position in society;
- An attitude that favours life-long learning.

Knowledge of the discipline

- Specialist knowledge of the subject with respect to the latest methodologies, techniques and theories:
- The ability to understand and interpret the way in which the pursuit of truth and the development of theories are changing;
- The ability to apply methods and techniques in independent research, understand the results and develop advanced ideas or practical applications;
- The ability to contribute original knowledge to at least one of the sub-disciplines in the field.

Non subject-specific skills

- The ability to understand and interpret knowledge and skills from other fields;



- The ability to conceive of their research in a multi-disciplinary context and to work in a multi-disciplinary research team.

Exit qualifications for the specializations

Exit qualifications for Applied Linguistics

Students who have completed the degree programme in **Applied Linguistics**:

- have knowledge of language acquisition theories with respect to both first and second languages; expertise with respect to educational psychology and pedagogical aspects of second-language acquisition processes;
- have developed skills with respect to academic research in the field of language acquisition and language education, including the causes and origins of language disorders and associated remedial approaches;
- have developed the skills required to develop target-group-specific teaching, educational and test materials.

Exit qualifications for Language Consultancy and Linguistic Documentation

Students who have completed the degree programme in Language Consultancy and Linguistic Documentation:

- have acquired extensive knowledge of developments in general and descriptive linguistics, particularly in relation to typological, functional and anthropological linguistics, and are able to understand and reflect critically on publications in this field;
- have a command of skills in the field of linguistics and are capable of independently carrying out research into the languages of the world, including languages that are unknown or have not yet been described:
- are able to report on their own research clearly and systematically and to link the results to theoretical developments in linguistics, particularly in the areas sub-disciplines mentioned above;
- are able to compile a reference grammar for a previously unknown language, complete with text and word lists, which meets the standards of contemporary linguistics.

Exit qualifications for Text Mining

Students who have completed the degree programme in **Text Mining**:

- have acquired knowledge of general and descriptive linguistics, in particular of those aspects that are relevant to automated text analysis;
- have specialist knowledge in the field of language technology (in particular compiling and working with language data), analytical techniques and methods and approaches to automatic text analysis;
- are able to use language technology software in order to solve practical and theoretical problems in the field of language technology, and particularly text mining;
- are able to analyse which data could be relevant to specific questions in specific (academic) fields, to collect those data, to extract relevant information, to interpret that information and to report on this process in a specialist manner that is accessible to the academic community. This implies a sound knowledge of the specialist field and an adequate command of academic English;
- are capable of reflecting on the societal implications of the automatic processing of data and are aware of current academic and societal debates in this area;
- have the ability to communicate their understanding of the field to specialists and to non-specialist audiences, which includes having an adequate command of academic English;
- are familiar with the rules and conventions of academic activity and are able to reflect critically on their own research and that of others, taking into account the prevailing ethics and standards within the academic community.
